Resources on Campus

RIT has loads of resources for you as an international student and you should use the services that they offer to help with your transition and they were able to help me on that transition as well. The resource that students like us have is, RIT's International Student Services, they mainly provide help when it comes to Visa's, documentations that you might need, and information about living in Rochester. Another resource would be international House which is special interest housing focused on students who come from international background which allows can allow you to find others on campus who have been through the same transition as you are currently going through. Lastly there many clubs and organizations that focus on diversity so do the research and see what clubs might interest you as an international student.
